January Answer. for "Coppicing"

In short, to provide wood for many uses, by a set, managed, rotation method, to encourage "new" growth from "stumps" of a variety of "mature" trees cut near to ground level. left, until the area is due again to be "Coppiced".

Coppicing also increases light to the woodland floor, which stimulates growth of various plants, & grasses, this then provides, food, shelter, for insects, birds, & Mammals.

Other uses of Coppiced wood land, includes, timber used in building Houses, fence, hurdle, craft work.

Charcoal production (pre large scale extraction of coal), for metal. Smelting, and other "high heat" requiring processes.
